### A New Year Message from our New Chair - Ben!

Hello everyone and Happy New Year – and this year better be different to 2020! And this is the first Havens Diary entry I get to write as chair of the boardwalk team (and it is a team effort, so big thanks to all), and I'm looking forward to what we can do in 2021. Or maybe I should say I'm looking forward to the ways we can help the boardwalk and slashpond area be a welcome place to go in our community and an inspiration for what a bit of getting involved in nature can do.

#### Here are some of our ideas for the year ahead:

- Commission a survey of the pond, biodiversity and depth/ layout
- Do the biannual clearing of plants in front of the dipping deck
- Improve the views from the birdwatching screen and viewing platform
- Explore what reed management could do for the pond and wildlife
- Develop the ground around the picnic area to show the different ways we can help spaces be good for animals, plants and soil
- Help other groups to know about the boardwalk and area and how they could use it
- And not to mention carrying on with keeping the boardwalk safe and getting involved in Havens events as and when they happen.

 You've read the above and thought "I know a bit about that", please let us know because we're always learning about what we're doing and you just might have some useful tips for us. No The Slash Pond Boardwalk is an alternative attraction to our

wonderful Seaside Award beach (the national standard for the best



beaches across the UK). At more than 350 metres, the boardwalk is a sheltered, non-slip, paw friendly decked walkway surrounding a serene pond in a habitat that supports a wildflower meadow, a picnic area, willow dens, bug houses and bat & bird nesting boxes.

Parking at Trafalgar Terrace car park (along the seafront, turn left at the Galleon Inn, <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> mile on the left. Parkina is free with a donation box at the entrance to help local community groups). Walk out of the car park, turn left, the walk entrance is 30 metres on the left. Sat Nav directions use SA62 3JU. Bring along a small net and enjoy the 'Dipping Deck' or test yourself with our Nature Trail Quiz. The area offers a circular route of approximately 1/2 mile which is accessible to motobility scooters, wheelchairs and pushchairs.

"Hello! Just to let you know a rare bird has been seen and heard at the Slash Pond, a Hume's Warbler. It would be the second record for Pembrokeshire. ... You have done a fabulous job with the boardwalk and interpretation, well done! Some nice birds around the area today included Firecrest, Water Rail and Black Redstart. Take care, Dave."

Here's an example image of a Hume's Warbler:



The Hume's Warbler is a very rare migrant in the UK, Isle of Man, and Ireland with just two records per year, and is most likely to occur during migration.

By far the rarest of the regular tiny leaf warblers in Britain, but there is an upward trend. This is a bird of late autumn, occurring in late October and November.

It has two call types: a cheery, rising che-wee, and a down-slurred swee-oo with a harsh, almost House Sparrow-like, quality.
