Boardwalk Habitat: Focus on Lichen

At last the weather has perked up and trips around the boardwalk can be at a gentler pace rather than braced against winds and rains!

The boardwalk information boards are a great source of info' as you take in the views, you may be surprised what you learn. By way of a preview ... let's focus on lichen which is found in abundance around the boardwalk:



The Slash Pond Boardwalk is an alternative attraction to our wonderful Seaside Glan Môr Award beach (the



national standard for the best beaches across the UK). At more than 350 metres, the boardwalk is a sheltered, non-slip, paw friendly decked walkway surrounding a serene pond in a habitat that supports a wildflower meadow, a picnic area, willow dens, bug houses and bat & bird nesting boxes.

Parking at Trafalgar Terrace car park (along the seafront, turn left at the Galleon Inn, 1/4 mile on the left. Parking is free with a donation box at the entrance to help local community groups). Walk out of the car park, turn left, the walk entrance is 30 metres on the left. Sat Nav directions use SA62 3JU. Bring along a small net and enjoy the 'Dipping Deck' or test yourself with our Nature Trail Quiz. The area offers a circular route of approximately ½ mile which is accessible to motobility scooters, wheelchairs and pushchairs.

Lichens are made up of two organisms; a fungus and an alga that function together as one complete being.

The alga contains chlorophyll, which uses sunlight to produce nutrients. This process feeds both of the organisms and is called Photosynthesis.

The fungus provides a body for them both to live in, and also produces a sunscreen like substance which protects the alga.

There are 1,600 species of lichen in Britain that vary in size, shape and colour. They grow on rocks, trees and bare ground, some look like crusty patches and others are bushy growths.

Lichens are a good indicator that air quality is good, they are particularly sensitive to sulphur dioxide pollution and are confined to areas of Britain with the purest oxygen. So the fact that they are thriving here is a positive sign.
